Explore Ecuador's Chocó Andes: A Birdwatching & Wildlife Hotspot

Embark on an unforgettable birding and wildlife watching adventure through Ecuador's breathtaking Chocó Andino de Pichincha Biosphere Reserve – a true biodiversity hotspot. The reserve lies just northwest of Quito, and this extraordinary region spans altitudes from 360m to 4,500m (1,200ft -14,800ft), creating an incredible variety of ecosystems teeming with life. Home to over 350 bird species, 63 only found in the Chocó bioregion; this is a higher density of endemic birds than anywhere else in the Americas. The refuge also harbors 270 mammals – including the elusive **Spectacled Bear** – 210 reptiles, and 130 amphibian species. These factors make the Chocó Andes one of the most biologically rich areas in the world, rivaling even the Amazon and Indonesian Archipelago.



Our Chocó Andes Tour takes you through the heart of this vibrant bioregion, exploring the humid lowland forests of the Chocó-Darién and the lush northern Andean mountain forests. Based in comfortably located eco-lodges such as Piripe Lodge, Kapari Lodge, and Sachatamia Lodge, you'll have prime access to worldclass birding hotspots like the Tandayapa and Mindo Valleys, Mashpi Amagusa Reserve, Paz de las Aves, and the Silanche lowlands. These pristine habitats are home to an astonishing array of regionally endemic and sought-after bird species that are only shared with neighboring Colombia to the north, including the striking Andean Cock-of-the-rock, Giant Antpitta^(VU), Platebilled Mountain-Toucan^(NT), Club-winged Manakin^, Glistening-green Tanager[^], Long-Wattled Umbrella Bird[^](VU), and Velvet-purple Coronet^. We'll also seek out rarities like the Black Solitaire[^], Chocó Vireo[^], and Indigo Flowerpiercer[^].

From the mystical elfin forests of the temperate zone to the birdrich subtropical cloud forests and tropical foothills, each step of the journey immerses you in spectacular

scenery, vibrant wildlife, and conservation-focused experiences. By birding in these reserves, you'll be actively supporting local conservation projects dedicated to preserving this precious ecosystem for generations to come.

With its diverse landscapes, top-notch lodges, and an astonishing concentration of rare and near-endemic species, northwest Ecuador is a dream destination for birders and nature enthusiasts alike. Join us for this ultimate birding adventure in one of the world's most enchanting and wildlife-rich regions.

DAY 1: Tuesday, February 3 **ARRIVAL IN QUITO**

We'll start our tour in the charming historical city of Quito, the capital of Ecuador, and conveniently located close to the Andean mountains. On arrival you'll be transferred from the airport to your hotel in the heart of the city. You'll meet your guide, trip leader, the rest of the group and receive a trip briefing.

DAY 2: Wednesday, February 4 ZURO LOMA – TANDAYAPA VALLEY - PACTO

We have an early start this morning to visit the recently created Zuro Loma Reserve, a small-scale independent reserve high on the slopes of Pichincha Volcano (3,200m/ 10,500ft). This reserve offers great opportunities to see three Antpitta species, including the specialty Chestnutnaped Antpitta (probably a cryptic new species awaiting description), Tawny Antpitta^, and the elusive Equatorial Antpitta. Hummingbird feeders entice Collared Inca, Tyrian Metaltail, Mountain Velvetbreast, Sapphirevented Puffleg, Buff-winged Starfrontlet[^], and the incredible **Sword-billed Hummingbird**. The reserve also has fruit feeders that attract Andean Guan, Blue-capped Tanager, Yellow-breasted Brushfinch, and Masked, White-sided and Glossy Flowerpiercers. There are also some other special bird species here, such as Black-and-**Chestnut Eagle**(EN), **Barred Fruiteater**, **Rufous-breasted** Chat-tyrant, Brown-bellied Swallow, and Red-crested **Cotinga**. Later, we will bird the famous Tandayapa Valley where we hope to find Green-and-Black Fruiteater, Plate-billed Mountain-Toucan^(NT), Powerful Woodpecker, Masked Trogon, Blue-and-Black Tanager, Pearled Treerunner, Gray-breasted Wood-Wren, Dusky Chlorospingus, and Blue-winged Mountain-Tanager. We'll have lunch in Guaycapi or enjoy a box lunch, and

then afterwards drive through Alambi to the Piripe Lodge, with birding stops along the way.

DAY 3: Thursday, February 5 **PACTO – SANTA ELENA**

We will enjoy a full day of birding around the Pacto area. Early in the morning, we'll visit one of the gaudiest of all South American birds, the **Andean Cock-of-the-Rock** and its display site, also known as a lek, at Santa Elena where male birds show off their "manliness" with noisy dances for the females watching on. The habitat around the lek may also provide sightings of **Smooth-billed Ani**, **Squirrel**

Cuckoo, Crowned Woodnymph, White-booted Racket-tail, Golden-olive Woodpecker, Scaled Antpitta, Buff-fronted Foliage-gleaner, Chocó Tyrannulet, and both Strong-billed and Spotted Woodcreepers. In the afternoon, we will look for birds while we visit a traditional farm successfully combining sugar cane and conservation. There will be many opportunities to bird in the surrounding areas. Lunch at the Lodge or a box lunch on the road will be provided. Today, we will have an opportunity to support the work of Fundacion Sembrando Esperanza and take part in a reforestation project by planting some trees.

DAY 4: Friday, February 6 UPPER MASHPI ROAD – MASHPI AMAGUSA RESERVE

Today is a very special day as we will enjoy our first exploration of the upper part of Mashpi Road and visit the Mashpi Amagusa and Mashpi Wasi Reserves where we'll enjoy some of the finest endemic cloud forest species, such as the rare Indigo Flowerpiercer[^], and a wide assortment of Tanagers, including Black-chinned Mountain[^], Glistening-green[^], Rufous-throated[^], Flame-faced, Golden-naped, Golden[^], and Moss-backed[^].

There will also be a whole range of Hummingbirds to enjoy, including Empress Brilliant[^], Velvet-purple Coronet[^], Violet-tailed Sylph[^], Brown Inca[^], Purple-bibbed Whitetip[^], all gorgeous Chocó endemics. There will also be chances for Crimson-rumped Toucanet and White-throated Quail-Dove. We'll have a box lunch at Mashpi Wasi Reserve while we watch an assortment of hummingbirds visiting the feeders and you'll learn how the Mashpi Lodge Research and Biology Team is working to preserve Puma using camera traps and GPS tracking. In the afternoon, we'll travel to our lodge with birding along the way.

DAY 5: Saturday, February 7 **MIDDLE TO LOWER MASHPI ROAD – MANDURIACU RESERVE**

We'll have an early departure from the lodge this morning to continue birding from the middle part of the Mashpi Road down to the lower elevations at around 900m (3,000ft). We'll be seeking mixed-species flocks which often contain Indigo Flowerpiercer, Chocó Vireo^(NT), Pacific Tuftedcheek^, Uniform Treehunter^, and Orange-breasted Fruiteater^. Toucan^(NT) and Orange-fronted^ Barbets, and Yellow-green Tanager^(VU) can also be found in these flocks. If we're fortunate, you'll get glimpses of the secretive Black^ or Rufous-brown Solitaires. We'll also be keeping a lookout for Rufous-fronted Wood-Quail^, Dusky Pigeon^, Pallid Dove, Bronzy Hermit, Band-tailed Barbthroat, Long-billed Starthroat,


Purple-crowned Fairy, Blue-chested Hummingbird, Black-tipped Cotinga, Ornate Hawk-Eagle(NT), Baudo Guan^(EN), Barred Puffbird, and White-capped Dipper. After a box lunch, there will be more birding, and a stop at Manduriacu River and Reserve to look for birds we haven't found yet, including waterbirds. This reserve was created by the EcoMinga Foundation and was featured in a PBS special that describes Ecuador's unique constitution that explicitly recognizes the rights of forests and nature.

DAY 6: Sunday, February 8

MASHPI ROAD and VICINITY

We'll have a full day of exploring the Mashpi Road and vicinity looking for Chocó specialty birds, such as Rose-faced Parrot^, Chocó Toucan^, Chocó Warbler^, Scarlet-browed^, Blue-whiskered^ and Rufous-throated^ Tanagers, Purple Quail Dove^, Orange-fronted Barbet^, Purple-chested Hummingbird^, and many more Chocó endemics. This area is part of a chocolate farm conservation project, and we'll hear how local farmers are managing the land for both wildlife and chocolate production. We'll enjoy lunch at a local restaurant and in the late afternoon transfer to Kapari Lodge.

Accommodation: Kapari Lodge, Los Blancos

DAY 7: Monday, February 9

UMBRELLABIRD DISPLAY

We will have an early start this morning to visit one of the best locations in the area to see the spectacular and increasingly rare male Longwattled Umbrellabird^(VU) in full breeding display. Other birds in this area include the Cloud-forest Pygmy Owl^(VU), Chocó Black-throated Trogon^, Club-winged Manakin^, and Black Solitaire. The Club-winged Manakin is famous for producing an amazing, fax machine-like sound with its wings. Depending on how successful our morning is, we might return to the lodge to bird around the grounds and explore the lower part of the reserve looking

for Bronze-winged Parrot, Pacific Hornero[^], Red-faced Spinetail, Rusty-margined Flycatcher, Chivi Vireo, Andean Solitaire, and Orange-billed Sparrow. We'll then drive to Sachatamia Lodge and check in.

DAY 8: Tuesday, February 10

LOWER ELEVATIONS OF THE CHOCÓ AREA

We will spend a full day of birding in the lower elevations of the Chocó area at around 500m (1,600ft), Silanche Road, and the Rio Silanche Bird Sanctuary. This very special place offers species that are only shared with neighboring Colombia. Unfortunately, deforestation is taking place at an alarming rate due to a combination of farming, mining, and oil palm plantations, and so who knows how long these birds will be able to live in this area.



DAY 8: continued...

The canopy tower at the Rio Silanche Bird Sanctuary provides great viewing opportunities of Scarlet-breasted^(VU) and Scarlet-thighed Dacnis', and Blue-whiskered^, Rufous-winged, Golden-hooded, Gray-and-Gold, Bay-headed, and Scarlet-browed Tanagers. Dusky Pigeon^ is also a regular here, and so are mixed flocks of Collared Araçari, and Yellow-throated Toucan, Scarlet-rumped Cacique, Slate-throated Gnatcatcher, Brown-capped Tyrannulet, Yellow-margined Flatbill, and White-tailed, Collared, Chocó Black-throated (recently elevated to species), and Blue-tailed^ Trogons. There are also some interesting Woodpeckers here – Cinnamon, Black-cheeked, Guayaquil, and the rare Crimson-bellied, as well as Black-striped and Northern Barred Woodcreepers. A number of Hummingbirds can also be found at this location, including Purple-chested^ and Blue-chested Hummingbirds, White-

whiskered Hermit[^] and Band-tailed Barbthroat. This reserve also has many antbirds that can be found skulking in the shadows; species like Checkerthroated Stipplethroat, Dot-winged, and White-flanked Antwrens, Tawny-faced Gnatwren, Black-crowned Antshrike, Chestnut-backed and Bicolored Antbirds, and Black-headed Antthrush. Scaly-throated Leaftosser, Black-tipped Cotinga and Brown Wood Rail[^](VU) are rare species that are sometimes encountered, as well as Plumbous Hawk and Berlepsch's Tinamou[^].

DAY 9: Wednesday, February 11

PAZ DE LAS AVES - DEPARTURE

The best way to finish this amazing birding tour is by visiting the famous Refugio Paz de las Aves for more Antpitta specialties, including **Yellow-breasted**^, **Giant**, **Moustached**^(VU), **Ochre-breasted**, and

Chestnut-crowned Antpittas. We will spend the rest of the morning looking for Crested Guan(NT), Golden-headed Quetzal, Red-billed Parrot, Broad-winged Hawk, Toucan Barbet^(NT), Nariño Tapaculo^, Crimson-rumped Toucanet, Scaled Fruiteater, Ornate Flycatcher, Gray-breasted Wood-Wren, Rufous-breasted Antthrush, many colorful Tanagers that may include Flame-rumped, Golden, Golden-naped, and Blue-winged Mountain-Tanager, and jewels of the forest that we've yet to see like Tawny-bellied Hermit, White-throated Daggerbill, Speckled Hummingbird, Buff-tailed Coronet, Fawn-breasted Brilliant, Purple-throated Woodstar, and Andean Emerald. At the end of the morning, we'll head to the lodge for lunch and then return to Quito for your international flight home.


Map shows the locations of lodging and planned birding sites during this program. Please note that the itinerary

CARBON OFFSET

Climate change threatens all life on the planet, as well as the very destinations that ecotourism relies upon. Tourism is responsible for roughly 8% of the world's carbon emissions, making it a significant contributor to climate change. A single return flight from Seattle to Quito, Ecuador produces about 1.8 metric tons of carbon emissions per passenger. That's just under 1/2 the amount of carbon the average person worldwide produces each year – just from one round trip flight.

Every time we fly, stay in a hotel, or ride in a car, carbon emissions are being generated. While there are many ways you can, and should, minimize your carbon footprint while traveling (e.g. turning off the A/C and lights when not in your room), no matter how sustainable our travel habits are, certain $\rm CO_2$ emissions are unavoidable. That's where carbon offsetting comes in. By calculating your carbon footprint, you can pay a small amount to an organization that supports a portfolio of forest, biodiversity, clean energy, and blue carbon projects that focus on capturing carbon and locking it away in the environment where it belongs.

Alight Tours is committed to reducing the negative impact its tourism activities have on the environment. We are partnering with <u>Sustainable Travel International</u> to offset all in-country ground transportation carbon emissions each passenger creates on every Alight Tours trip.

WEATHER

The climate in Ecuador varies enormously, depending on the region and the altitude. Quito is mild and temperate with chilly nights. Within the Chocó region in February, weather is warm and humid with mean temperatures ranging from 71-88°F (22-31°C). Rainfall in February is common, but usually shortlived totaling about 3.5cm (1.5in) of the month.

Highland Extension

The Ecuador: Birding the Chocó-Andes tour takes you to the cloud forests of the Chocó region; with this 2-day extension you'll ascend to the breathtaking highlands of the Ecuadorian Andes. This tour extension takes you above the treeline, where the paramo ecosystem unfolds in sweeping landscapes of open skies and dramatic mountain vistas.

In the crisp high-altitude air, we enter the realm of the majestic **Andean Condor**, soaring effortlessly over rugged peaks. These highlands offer unique birding opportunities not found on the main tour, including **Giant Hummingbird**, **Rufous-bellied Seedsnipe**, and **Stout-billed Cinclodes**[^]. And if fortune smiles, you may catch a glimpse of the elusive **Spectacled Bear** — South America's only bear species, and the real-life inspiration behind Paddington.

This extension is intended to be an addition to the main Birding the Chocó-Andes trip – departing 3-11 February

DAY 1: Monday, February 2 **QUITO – ANTISANA NATIONAL PARK**

Before we embark on our main excursion, you'll be collected from your hotel and travel east towards Antisana National Park 3,500m (11,500ft). This reserve is one of the most iconic locations in the Andean highlands consisting of paramo habitat and more than 70 associated avian specialties, like Giant Hummingbird, Andean Gull, Black-faced Ibis, Speckled Teal, Torrent Duck, Rufous-bellied Seedsnipe, Carunculated Carcara, Silvery Grebe, Andean Lapwing, and the spectacular Andean Condor(VU) among others. It's an amazing place to enjoy the Andean landscape with Antisana Volcano in the background rising to 5,760m (18,900ft), the fourth highest peak in Ecuador.

DAY 1: cont.

We'll learn why this habitat is so important over lunch at Tambo Condor, a cozy restaurant with amazing views of cliffs that host roosting Condors. This afternoon we'll continue towards Termas de Papallacta, a charming hotel with some great birds found in the grounds – **Tourmaline Sunangel**, **Tyrian Metaltail**, **Shining Sunbeam**, **Turquoise Jay**, and **Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager**. We'll enjoy time in the hotel's hot springs and have dinner.

Overnight: Termas de Papallacta Hotel, Papallacta - L, D

DAY 2: Tuesday, February 3

CAYAMBE COCA NATIONAL PARK – QUITO

Today we'll spend a full day around the Cayambe Coca National Park, looking for other high-elevation birds including Tawny Antpitta^, Stout-billed Cinclodes^, and Cinereous Conebill.

We'll traverse the area and get a true sense of the unique flora in this region and have great chances of spotting a Spectacled Bear(VU). We'll have a delicious lunch at the lodge and then in the late afternoon return to Quito to continue to our main trip. At birding stops along the way we may encounter Black-chested Buzard-Eagle, Torrent Tyrannulet, Black Flowerpiercer^, Andean Titspinetail, Many-striped Canestero, and Plumbeous Sierra Finch.


